

The Next Chapter

The Methodist movement has changed numerous times through the years, and our congregation has changed right along with it. When our church was founded in 1828, we were a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Then, in 1844 when the northern and southern church split over slavery, we went along with the southern church (as did all the churches in Mississippi) and became a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Then, we became First Methodist Church in 1939 when the northern and southern church merged back together again. And finally, when The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren merged in 1968, we became First United Methodist Church.



Now a new chapter begins. As of July 1st, we officially became a part of the Global Methodist Church. And this past Wednesday, July 5th, our Trustees signed the Final Disaffiliation Agreement and made the disaffiliation payment that formally ended our connection to the United Methodist Church.

Our new church name is **First Methodist Church**, the same as it was before 1968.

This **Sunday**, **July** 9th, will be our first Sunday as 100% fully Global Methodist, and we will recognize that as part of our worship service. I am excited for what God is doing through the Global Methodist Church.

The **Mississippi-West Tennessee** Provisional Annual Conference will likely launch August 1st, with a Convening Conference in late January (after the last of the December disaffiliations). As of July 3, our growing Conference already has 95 churches, and new churches and pastors are joining every day. The Global Methodist Church as a whole currently has over 2500 churches that have joined. God is doing a new thing in Methodism. May you and I join together in it!

On Wednesday, June 28, the evening after the Mississippi Annual Conference UMC voted to approve all 189 disaffiliating churches, the Mississippi-West Tennessee soon-to-be Provisional Annual Conference hosted its first gathering at the Tupelo Cotton Mill in downtown Tupelo.

Over 200 people were present, representing many of the disaffiliating churches. After a catfish dinner, we sang hymns, prayed, and gave thanks to God for His faithfulness in bring us thus far. It was a great beginning for the Global Methodist Church in Mississippi!
